









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Downhill Skiing


Snow, Mobile


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Each circle represents a pile of snow that needs to be moved in one direction horizontally or vertically. Piles labeled with numbers must be moved that exact distance. Unlabeled piles can be moved any distance (at least 1 space). The piles' paths may not intersect each other at all, even at start and end points. After all piles have been moved, every heavilyoutlined region must contain exactly one pile.
